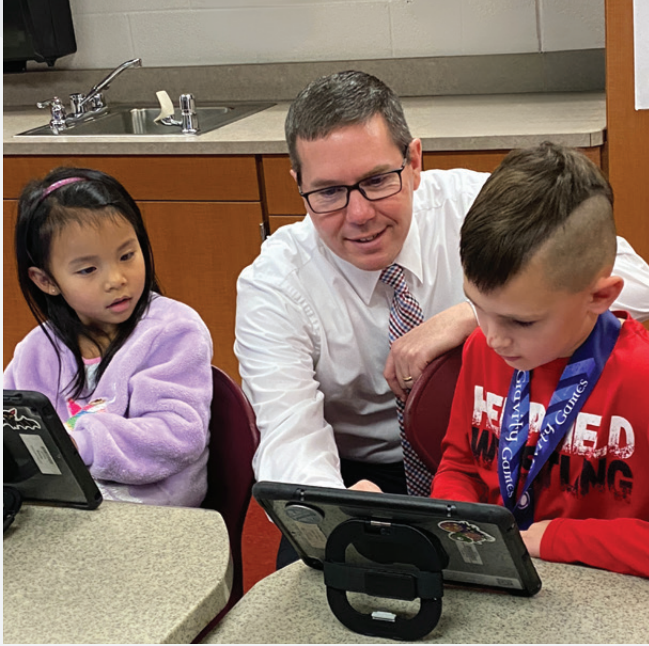

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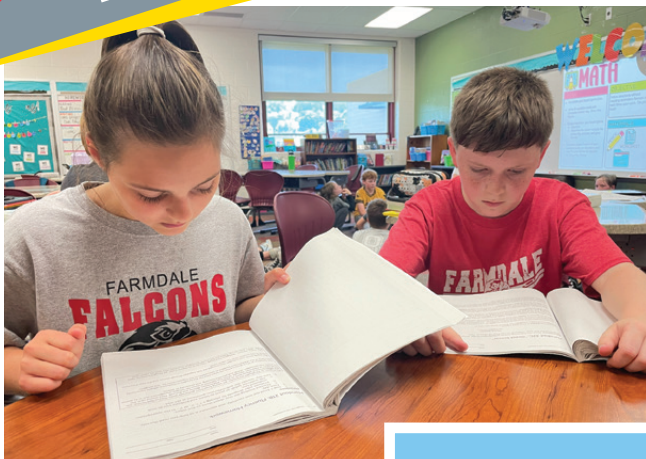

After a thoughtful and thorough two-year pilot process, the board approved the adoption of **Wit & Wisdom as the District's new Elementary English Language Arts program (K-6)**, beginning with the 2024-25 school year. Administrators sought extensive feedback from teachers, staff, students, and families and analyzed data to make a recommendation to the board.

Wit & Wisdom is an engaging, knowledge-building program that is solidly aligned with the most recent research on the science of reading. All aspects of English Language Arts (reading, writing, speaking, and listening) are seamlessly integrated into the program as students interact with a wide variety of texts.

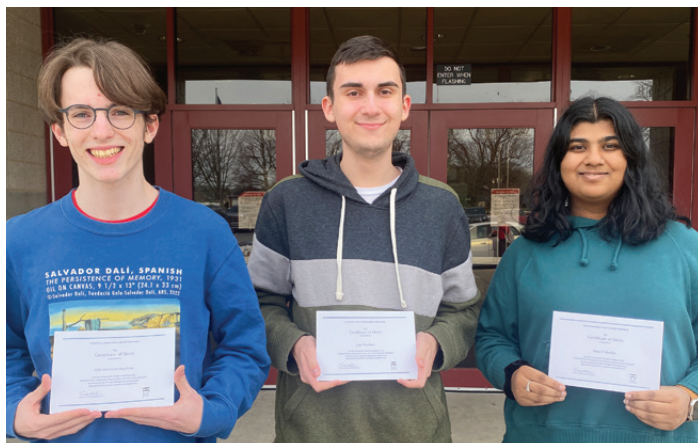

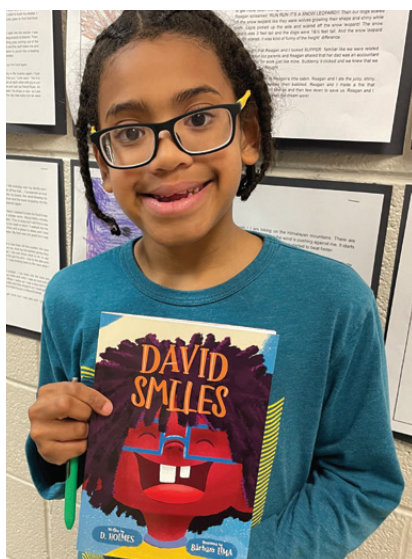
Choral Celebration

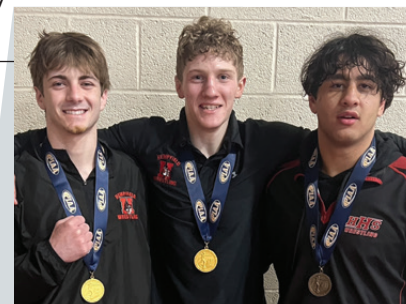
HHS boys swim team

coach Danny Walck surpassed career win number 400, along with Senior Ben Troyer (left) who reached 1,000 career points.



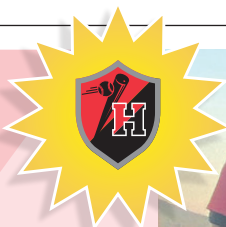
Hempfield crowned two district wrestling champions with Seamus Mack (139 lbs) and Kyle

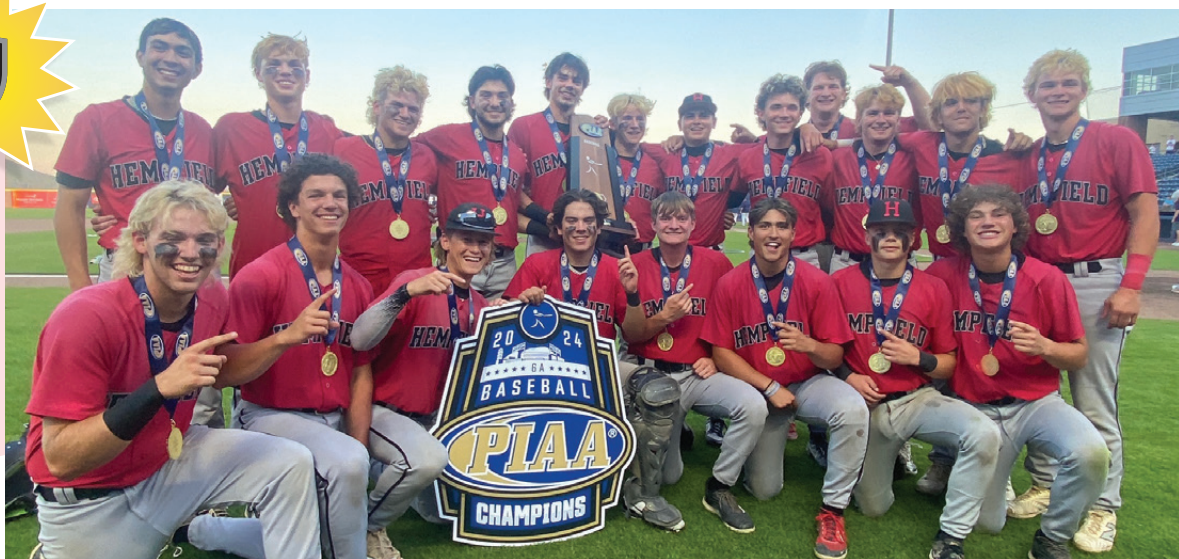


Priest McKenzie qualified for the state bowling tournament.

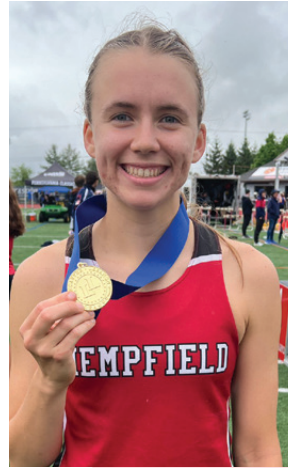


On the track, Ella Wolfe won a league championship in the 1600m and 3200m runs, while Eddie Asadu won the league crown in the long jump.

For the 2024-25 school year, parents/guardians should plan ahead for the required health documents and immunizations. Being prepared allows Hempfield School District nurses to better serve our students.
